Standard Operating Procedure for switching Keppra preparations to generic Levetiracetam preparations

Important: This is for use by practice supporting pharmacy teams across Lancashire and South Cumbria ICB

The information in this sheet should be read in conjunction with the detailed information in the BNF and the products' Summary of Product Characteristics

	 Prescribe generic levetiracetam tablets/oral solution for all new patients who require treatment with levetiracetam Review all patients currently prescribed Keppra tablets/oral solution and switch, where appropriate, to generic levetiracetam tablets/oral solution
Action(s)	It is recommended that any switches/changes to medication are only made by appropriately qualified registered Health Care Professionals. Where this is not possible the practice must ensure governance arrangements are in place and that safe practice is followed at all times.
	Any switch should be tailored to the individual patient
	Generic prescribing is recognised as a sign of good practice in terms of consistency and safety, as well as generally being more cost effective. It allows any suitable generic (or equivalent branded product) to be dispensed, reduces the number of items to be held as stock in the pharmacy and can potentially reduce the delays in supplying medicines to the patient. Antiepileptic drugs have been divided into three risk-based categories to help healthcare professionals decide whether it is necessary to maintain
Rationale	continuity of supply of a specific manufacturer's product. Levetiracetam is a category 3 antiepileptic drug. MHRA/CHM (2017) advises: For these drugs, it is usually unnecessary to ensure that patients are maintained on a specific manufacturer's product as therapeutic equivalence can be assumed, however, other factors are important when considering whether switching is appropriate. Differences between alternative products (e.g. product name, packaging, appearance, and taste) may be perceived negatively by patients and/or carers, and may lead to dissatisfaction, anxiety, confusion, dosing errors, and reduced adherence. In addition, difficulties for patients with co-morbid autism, mental health problems, or learning disability should also be considered. MHRA/CHM advice: Antiepileptic drugs: updated advice on

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New Medication	Levetiracetam, to be prescribed at same dose/frequency as previous preparation. Use the 'replace' button function on Emis and add reason for replacement as 'cost effective switch' Add correct replacement drug, dosage, quantity and prescription type		
Emis consultation entry	Code consultation entry as 'medication change to generic' Consultation entry to make - Patient reviewed in line with LSCMMG position statement and Keppra switched to Levetiracetam. Patient medication record amended by and contact made with patient to advise them of the change in medication.		
Follow Up	At next routine planned medication review or sooner if required.		
Communication to Patients	The preferred method of communication with patients should be agreed with the individual practice.
